What does home infusion mean?

When considering treatment with ONPATTRO™ (patisiran), you and your healthcare professional may determine that you can receive your treatments at home.



Home infusion is not an option for every patient being treated with ONPATTRO. Each patient's treatment plan is unique, and insurance coverage can vary—some private insurance plans and some state Medicaid and Medicare programs do not cover home infusion.

Your Alnylam Case Manager can answer any questions you may have and help you know what to expect with home infusion.

This guide will help you prepare to receive ONPATTRO infusions at home.

What's different about home infusion?

The process of home infusion will be similar to what you may have experienced at an infusion center:

- Your doctor will prescribe ONPATTRO™ (patisiran) and work with Alnylam Assist™ to arrange home infusion
- A specialty pharmacy (either Orsini Healthcare or US Bioservices) will call you to discuss the timing of your infusion and answer any questions you may have about the home infusion process
- Your home infusion nurse will call you to schedule your first infusion and set up an infusion schedule
- ONPATTRO medication and related infusion supplies will be delivered to your home
- A nurse will come to your home on the scheduled day and will prepare and administer ONPATTRO and monitor you during and after the infusion, if needed
- You will continue to receive support services from Alnylam Assist, including financial assistance for eligible individuals,^a disease education, and help connecting to local resources



Your prescribed medication will be sent directly to you from a specialty pharmacy (Orsini Healthcare or US Bioservices). Some of these medications, including ONPATTRO, will need to be stored in the refrigerator.

How will I receive ONPATTRO™ (patisiran) and the infusion supplies?

ONPATTRO and the supplies needed for your infusion will be delivered directly to your home by a specialty pharmacy. Someone may need to be home to sign for the delivery, which will arrive in a refrigerated box. The first shipment from the specialty pharmacy will include a **Welcome Packet** that includes important contact information and ambulatory infusion pump instructions.

The first shipment may also contain additional supplies that are needed for the infusion process, such as an IV pole and ambulatory infusion pump. Additional emergency medications may be delivered as needed. Please store these medications according to the instructions in your Welcome Packet.

Make sure you have space in a refrigerator to store your medication. Consider getting a small refrigerator dedicated to storing your medication.



Storage Instructions

ONPATTRO



A white to off-white coating may be seen on the inner surface of the vial; the quality of the medicine is not impacted by this coating. **Do not shake the medication.**



Store the medicine in your refrigerator as soon as you receive it, keeping the vials in their cartons.



Do not freeze. If the contents in the vial freeze, reach out to your Alnylam Case Manager to arrange disposal and replacement vials.

Infusion Supplies

- IMPORTANT—store these supplies in a cool, dry place with enough room to store several boxes
- When choosing a place to store these supplies, make sure it is not exposed to sunlight or too close to a heat source, such as a radiator, water heater, stove, or refrigerator fan
- If you do leave your supplies outside in the heat or too close to a heat source, please reach out to your Alynlam Case Manager to arrange disposal and replacement of the supplies

Premedications

Your doctor will prescribe premedications with your treatment plan. Instructions for how to store these medications will be included in the shipment from your specialty pharmacy.

These premedications may include:

- Corticosteroid, such as dexamethasone
- Tylenol (acetaminophen)
- Antihistamines, such as Benadryl (diphenhydramine) and Zantac (ranitidine)

Premedications are usually administered at least 60 minutes before each ONPATTRO infusion. You should take your premedications as instructed by your home infusion nurse or doctor.



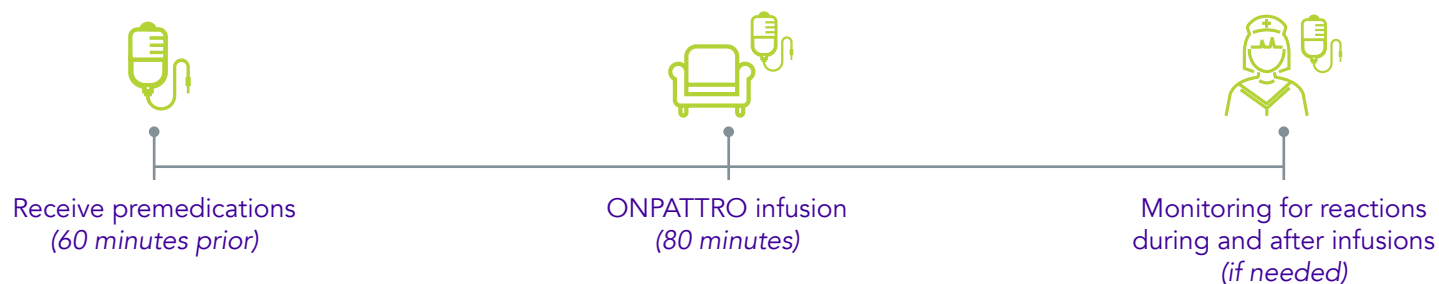
In case of a power outage, ONPATTRO™ can be stored at room temperature up to 77°F for up to 14 days.

What is the process for home infusion?

ONPATTRO™ (patisiran) will be given by IV infusion once every 3 weeks by a nurse. Prior to your scheduled infusion, your nurse will call to confirm your appointment date and time.

- Step 1** Before your nurse arrives, set up a space for the infusion process. This may include a comfortable chair and a clean space for the nurse to work. Take time to gather the infusion supplies and remove the ONPATTRO vials from the refrigerator so they are ready for your infusion nurse.
- Step 2** Prior to the IV infusion, you will receive premedications commonly used to help prevent infusion-related reactions during or after the procedure.
- Step 3** The nurse will prepare and administer ONPATTRO through an IV infusion while periodically checking to make sure there are no issues with your infusion as you receive your prescribed dose, which takes about 80 minutes. After you've received your dose, you may be monitored in case you have any reactions to ONPATTRO. During your infusion you may want to do some quiet activities such as reading, working on a computer, or watching TV.
- Step 4** After your infusion, you should schedule your next infusion visit if you haven't already done so.

What are the possible side effects?

The most frequently occurring side effects in patients treated with ONPATTRO™ were respiratory infections, such as colds, sinus infections, and nasal congestion, and infusion-related reactions such as:

- Flushing of skin
- Back pain
- Nausea
- Abdominal pain
- Headache
- Difficulty breathing

The majority of side effects were mild to moderate in severity, although some were considered severe. Infusion-related reactions decreased over time.



If you experience any side effects after your nurse has left, reach out to your doctor as soon as possible. In case of an emergency, dial 9-1-1.

Indication and Important Safety Information for ONPATTRO™ (patisiran)

Indication

What is ONPATTRO™ (patisiran)?

ONPATTRO is a medicine that treats the polyneuropathy caused by an illness called hereditary transthyretin-mediated amyloidosis (hATTR amyloidosis). ONPATTRO is used in adults only.

Important Safety Information

What are the most important things I should know about ONPATTRO?

ONPATTRO can cause:

• Infusion-related reactions

ONPATTRO is given as a drip into a vein (called an “intravenous infusion”). Reactions to this infusion may happen during treatment with ONPATTRO. Before each infusion you will be given medicines that help to lower the chance of infusion-related reactions.

Tell your doctor or nurse right away if you experience any of the following signs of an infusion-related reaction during treatment:

- Reddening of the face or body (flushing), skin warm
- Body aches or pain, including pain in the back, neck, or joints
- Feeling sick (nausea)
- Stomach pain
- Feeling short of breath, cough, or other breathing problems
- Headache
- Chest discomfort or chest pain
- Rash
- Chills
- Dizziness
- Feeling tired (fatigue)
- Rapid heart rate
- Facial swelling

If you have an infusion-related reaction, your doctor or nurse may slow down or stop your infusion, and you may need to take other medicines. When these reactions stop, or get better, your doctor or nurse may decide to start the infusion again.

- **Low Vitamin A levels**

Treatment with ONPATTRO lowers the amount of vitamin A in your blood. Your doctor will tell you to take a vitamin A supplement every day. You should not take more than the amount of vitamin A recommended by your doctor.

Low vitamin A levels can affect vision. If you have problems with your vision (e.g., night blindness) while taking ONPATTRO, talk to your doctor. Your doctor may refer you to an eye specialist.

What are the common side effects of ONPATTRO?

The most common side effects of ONPATTRO are respiratory infections, such as colds, sinus infections, and nasal congestion, and infusion-related reactions. These are not all the possible side effects of ONPATTRO. Talk to your doctor about side effects that you experience.
